From the President

The Art Society of Tasmania was founded in 1884 with



the objective to encourage art and hold periodic exhibitions. In 2023 we certainly fulfilled these objectives, we ended the year with 245 members, held 15 exhibitions, and conducted 9 workshops. We also had artists meeting weekly in the gallery in various art groups to paint and socialise.

Individuals with a sense of personal responsibility, a shared experience and

commitment beyond themselves build a community, and that is what I believe is achieved in this Society. Our people are our strength, we are a collective of artists and art lovers dedicated to the success of the Society. Our exhibitions, openings, workshops and events bring people together to build relationships built on mutual support and friendship. Our membership base is guite constant, many of our members have been with the Society for many years and we are welcoming to new members who are embraced by the wider membership. The Art Society provides a place for members to regularly exhibit their work in the Lady Franklin Gallery, however for this to occur we require members to regularly volunteer to sit in the gallery. Looking forward I'd like to see the load of sitting in the gallery spread more evenly across the membership.

I would especially like to thank our social members who give their time and energy to the Art Society without the reward of seeing their work on the walls. Two of our committee members Phil Muir and Sarah Crossland give much of their time to support the society without the benefits afforded to our exhibiting members. We are so grateful for the contribution of our social members. Our Vice Patron, Rob Valentine MLC recently wrote to me and he stated of his association with the Society: See page 23.

AGM Report for 2023

I am so proud to lead the Art Society, and I am privileged to volunteer in this space, to hang each exhibition and spend time looking at and appreciating the works created by our members and invited artists. I love watching the development of our members as they try new methods or tackle new themes for our members exhibitions. I love the process of hanging an exhibition, with Carol doing all the hard work of selecting the order the works will be hung, to bring out the best in each work. There is magic that happens in this gallery after all the works have been delivered and an exhibition starts to take shape.

I love attending our openings and watching others appreciate the works on the wall and talking to other artists about their work and inspiration. I love talking to you, our members when I see you at the gallery or attending a workshop. The friendships and camaraderie in this place, where there is genuine kindness, and very few egos, gives me joy.

The Art Society is financially secure which enables us to continue to operate as we have been. Overall, there was an operating surplus of \$21,000 for the year. It enables us to continue to hire the Long Gallery for our Annual Exhibition and Waterways and allows us to seek high quality tutors for our workshops.

The Art Society has some very accomplished exhibiting members, and these artists are increasingly being recognised by other arts organisations and selected exhibitions. It was wonderful to see members of the Art Society's work on display at the Henry Jones exhibition in 2023. And I can't wait to arrive at the Glover Art Prize next weekend and see the work of 5 members of the Art Society exhibited in Evandale. As an arts organisation holding exhibitions is fundamental to what we do. I'd like to thank all our exhibiting members who engaged with the themes and produced artwork for our exhibitions.

As with any voluntary organisation, you get out as much as you put in, new friendships are formed sitting in the gallery for a day with a member you may not have spoken to before. New ideas and artistic inspiration may come from an informal chat at an opening or from attending a workshop.

Water Ways was held in the Long Gallery in February 2023, with 119 artists from around the State submitting 200 works in all mediums. The overall winner of the exhibition was Brad Quinn and we will be seeing more of his work in November 2024 when he holds an exhibition at the Lady Franklin Gallery.

Joan Humble held a very successful exhibition Our Beautiful Tasmania in the Lady Franklin Gallery in April. It was a beautiful exhibition and an amazing way to celebrate a 85th Birthday. Thank you Joan for sharing your work with us and for your contribution as an artist and tutor in Tasmania.

Amber Koroluk-Stephenson and Jo Chew transformed the Lady Franklin Gallery with their exhibition Figment. This was a very different look for the Gallery and explored the history of the Gallery and the Franklins. A very fitting exhibition to celebrate the 180th anniversary of the Gallery.

The 139th Annual exhibition was held in the Long Gallery in September 2023 and congratulations to Vicki Chapman who was the overall winner of the exhibition from a total of 150 works on display. The Art Society will continue to hold the Annual Exhibition at the Long Gallery as it provides our members with the opportunity to display their work in the artistic centre of Hobart. It also provides the space for each member to submit two works for the exhibition.

It was exciting to see an exhibition by our newest group of members, The Photographers in September 2023. Each of them has a distinct way of working and they captured the stunning landscape of Tasmania.

Kaye Volkman and Elizabeth Hunn held a successful exhibition Love this State in November. Whilst each artist has a unique style their works complimented each other.

I'd like to thank all the members of the Committee for all their assistance, at hand in and for hanging, for coordinating openings and being there when needed. But most importantly I'd like to thank them for their friendship and the way they conduct themselves with kindness, integrity and a sense of shared purpose. I am delighted that they have all decided to remain on the committee for another year.

Thank you to our Patron, her Excellency Barbara Baker, who so kindly opened our Annual exhibition in 2023 and invited us to Government House to celebrate the 180th anniversary of the Lady Franklin Gallery. I wish to thank our Vice Patron Rob Valentine MLC, who is an ardent supporter of the Art Society. His association with the Art Society in role of Patron or Vice Patron has continued for 25 years.

I wish to thank our Vice Patron Hobart Lord Mayor Anna Reynolds for her support during the year. I'd like to thank the Hobart City Council for preserving and maintaining this wonderful building, and for providing it to the Art Society.

And lastly I'd like to thank Lady Jane Franklin who in 1842 had the vision to build a small Greek temple in a colonial settlement to foster the arts, and opened it just before returning to England and leaving it in the hands of the colony.


Rick Crossland an award winning plein air painter and traveller, invited by coordinator Georgie Cane, gave a heartfelt talk to the well attended Friday evening opening of a wonderful exhibition 'From My Travels'



It would have been easy for me to just say 'what a wonderful exhibition' but I wanted to dig under the surface, to point out what to me is significant about this exhibition. When thinking about what to say I remembered this quote from the wonderful NZ wildlife artist Raymond Harris-Ching, who said "Drawing is possession. Every creature I've ever drawn is inside me still." Everyday life (unless you are amongst the fortunate few) is often mundane and it can become a blur. Those of us lucky enough to travel get a break from the mundane. We experience something different, a new place, country, culture or perhaps to revisit a place of significance from our past. Almost without exception we want to bring something of our travel experience and adventures back with us.

This may be in the form of photos, music, a recipe, a journal, painting or drawing. My own travel doodles, paintings and writing take me right back to the special moments when they were created It's a way of hanging onto that moment when I felt alive, in that I took notice of what I was doing. I wasn't just 'comfortably numb', to quote the lyrics of the song by Pink Floyd. When it comes to painting, the cliché 'he or she has captured it!' comes to mind. In 'capturing' something it not just reminds us of a time which was special and allows us to possess and relive it, it can also remind us to make the most of the time we still have.

Some months ago I watched a short clip on Instagram about a French lady in her 80's. She was confined to a wheelchair and had advanced dementia which had robbed her of her memory and who she was. She had formerly been a ballet dancer, performing all over the world. Her doctor started to play music from one of her more famous performances. The change in her facial expressions was amazing. She began to dance with her arms, the movements came to her automatically from a memory triggered by the music. It was a wonderful example of how the creative process can influence recall and memory. Creativity is such an important part of being alive and being human. The works in this exhibition demonstrate this. Each artist has expressed something meaningful to them, at a time and place when they felt alive and wished to hang on to that experience, image, understanding or feeling and hopefully communicate it to others. It is a wonderful exhibition.



A Swiss Experience

This article was provided by AST member Barbara Etter. She travelled to Switzerland to join a workshop retreat with master pastellist Lyn Diefenbach, one of our most popular Australian pastel tutors.

In October 2023, I attended a 10 day pastel Artable retreat in Appenzell, Switzerland, with Lyn Diefenbach.

Appenzell is the smallest canton in Switzerland. It is up in the N-E corner of the country. The main language in that area is Swiss German so I was able to practice my High School German.



Appenzell is a small village near Zurich nestled in green rolling hills with surrounding mountains. We stayed in a small family-run hotel right on the town square. It was a beautifully decorated Swiss chalet.

The emphasis of the retreat was on pastels, particularly landscapes, portraits and florals. But there was also an opportunity to do en plein air in the spectacular Swiss landscape.

We were very fortunate to have been in Appenzell for the annual parading of the

Alpine cows down the main street, with the people dressed in traditional costume or "tracht" and the cows adorned with massive traditional cow bells. Lyn did some amazing demonstrations during the retreat including a portrait of a young Swiss girl from the parade, a portrait of a Swiss Brown cow and an incredible en plein air landscape of the nearby river, with the hills in the background. She emphasized the importance of colour, edge, line and values.





Lyn also regaled us with her cleverly crafted poems she wrote overnight about our amusing experiences, including a story about one of the Swiss Brown cows at the previous year's parade making her way into the local perfume shop! We were also amused by an art installation on a main thoroughfare that was nothing much more than a rotating manhole in the middle of the road.

We had some very talented women on the course. I was able to produce a number of human portraits, a couple of animal portraits (a goat and a cow) and a floral of a poppy with a buzzing bee. (See photo).

We also fitted in some sight-seeing (including a cable car ride to the top of a nearby mountain) and some great culinary experiences. There was much frivolity singing songs from The Sound of Music.



I managed to haul a 30 kg bag all the way to Switzerland and back. I had to have my favourite sets of pastels with me at the expense of my wardrobe. We were blessed with 10 perfect days of weather in their Autumn or 'Herbst'. This was truly a once in a lifetime experience not only for the art learnings and insights but for the wonderful cultural experience, new friendships, and warm hospitality of the Swiss people.

LIBRARY NEWS

The story of a unique publication new to our library: *BIRDS OF TASMANIA* by Susan Lester

Susan *was* commissioned in the 1980's to produce 200 paintings of Tasmania's birds for a limited edition book to commemorate the Examiner newspaper's 150th anniversary. Sue worked for four years to produce the exquisite, detailed paintings. She collaborated with Dr Bob Green, QVMAG's well known ornithologist and spent much time observing the birds in the bush and drawing museum specimens to ensure accuracy.

As she delivered the paintings, the Examiner's parent company ENT was caught in Tasmania's bribery scandal, and company chairman Edmund Rouse was jailed. The book project was abandoned and the paintings forgotten.

Almost a decade later, an accountant in Hobart's WIN commercial television studio, previously owned by Rouse, found the paintings and took them to the TMAG where the curators helped identify the collection and the extraordinary story of the commission and loss. WIN generously donated the paintings to TMAG, and 40 were displayed in the Bond Store in 2001 in a stunning exhibition.

On 30th January 2022, Sue died after a short, intense battle with cancer.

With the support of TMAG Sue's family and OUTSIDE THE BOX/Earth Arts Rights have now created *Birds of Tasmania.* In keeping with Sue's exquisite paint-

ings, *Birds of Tasmania* is a truly bespoke publication. In the tradition of the folio volumes by significant bird artists of the Victorian age, many of the paintings are reproduced as full-page colour-plate illustrations and are supported with historical commentary.

 $\bar{\rm I}$ feel humbled to be made a Life Member of the Society, and to be put in the company of the outstanding people who have been previous Life Members.


Being a member of the Society has been an important part of my life, and doing the work




Lands of Light: Lloyd Rees and Tasmania

Opening date: 07-03-2024 **Closing date**: 27-10-2024 This exhibition celebrates the work of Lloyd Rees (1895-1988), particularly his works painted in Tasmania between 1967 and 1988. Rees was one of the pre-eminent Australian landscape artists of the twentieth century and a highly accomplished painter, draughtsman and printmaker.

Unshackled: The True Convict Story

Opening date : 13-03-2024 Closing date : 28-07-2024 Unshackled tells a new story of convict Australia drawn from recent discoveries within the UNESCO listed convict records. It highlights the shared but different experiences of the dispossessed poor, the political radicals and First Nations resistors across Australia who were forced into the convict system

It is going to be such a great show with something for everyone. The first gallery is mainly of his early work with some very accurate pencil sketches. His paintings range from early traditional landscapes to the broad, final works where the sun and atmosphere became so important.

The 8th of March is the opening day and I will be taking a tour on the 8th and 16th of March.

CASTLE FORBES BAY ART SHOW

Congratulations to the winner Nicola Oliver with her dress made from books. Nicola has also accepted the artist in residence at Geeveston Town Hall and Visitor centre.

From 2021, Ruth Bosveld and Fiona Verdouw took regular trips along southern Tasmanian back-roads; discovering old churches and capturing their charm in oil paint.

Early on in their plein air painting friendship, Ruth and Fiona captured land-scapes exclusively.

It wasn't long before Ruth suggested branching out to try painting a series of old farming sheds. She had been inspired by the work of Gwen Gutwein from Indiana, USA.

Fiona admitted to feeling daunted about painting buildings, but thought that old Tasmanian churches would possibly offer more variety than sheds.

Since many churches are no longer used as places of worship, for various reasons, capturing them as they are now would be a worthwhile project from a preservation of history perspective too.

What followed was two years of - more or less - monthly trips taken along southern Tasmania's back-roads; hunting down churches to try capturing their charm with oil paint (often in the rain, or under the threat of storm clouds.)

They looked for buildings that had character, or which stood out in the surrounding landscape well. Noteworthy features like bell towers and porticos were also sought after. Not every church painted had ceased to be a place of worship, but many had been repurposed in some way or stand waiting to be. One, is already due for demolition.

Sometimes Ruth and Fiona painted the same view, but often, different angles were chosen.

Part of the enjoyment of the project was discovering how two artists can be looking at the same building, but approach painting it very differently:

Ruth sees the structure as a whole and almost always captured the entire building in her compositions; not wanting to lose anything of it in her work. In contrast, Fiona often couldn't help but zoom in on details.

Reflecting on this, Fiona wondered if she was simply too fearful of attempting to draw the entire church, and was taking the easy route. Ruth takes a kinder view on things and points to Fiona's background as a graphic designer playing a role. Using a feature to suggest the whole is a long-held part of her creative process.

Both artists agree that these two differing perspectives make the collection of paintings all the more interesting as a whole.

In addition to the enjoyment of observing and painting the buildings, Ruth and Fiona found learning about the history of each church was also very satisfying.

Sometimes, whilst painting, current owners or people with past association to a church stopped to chat. Other times, people reached out to Ruth and Fiona on social media, or recommended blogs that were particularly insightful.

Far from being a simple exercise in applying colour and tone, the subject matter took on greater significance as dates, names and events surrounding each church were discovered. Often, the churches were not just a place of worship, but centres of community activity and a source of civic pride.

Which makes it fitting to see Ruth and Fiona's collection of paintings - with a brief history of each - on display in St David's Cathedral cloisters, as part of the church's 150th Anniversary celebrations this year.


